The large parcel of unused land known as the "Orion Site" (due to it previously being owned by Christchurch Electricity Network owner Orion) has always been a topic of debate within St Albans and the entire city, primarily due to its size in such a central city location, and the nature of its use. That is to say, it has stayed 95% unused for many years. It seemed such an odd sight to see such a large parcel of unused land in a largely L3 zoned section of a central city suburb, as high density townhouse development dominated its surrounds and land being in high demand pre-quake for this very reason.

Bordered by Canon, Packe, Madras and Purchas streets, the large site has seen 7 townhouses built on the Madras/Purchas corner, and further sections that were attempted to be sold on the Canon street side unsuccessfully.

Other plans for supermarkets and commercial development have also been put forward but subsequently failed to come to fruition.

With the city-wide rebuild now gathering some substantial momentum, the potential use of this site was again revisited. The owners – JGM Group Limited – have applied and had approved, planning consent for a new temporary (10 year) workers accommodation village, to house up to 200 out of town rebuild workers. Titled "Cressy Village", a letter was recently sent outlining the details to local residents and our very own St Albans Residents Association.

Each unit will be of a high standard, and will include an en-suite bathroom, gas "on demand" heating, queen-single bed, flat-screen TV, Wi-Fi, and flat-panel LED lighting. The

With the 2nd anniversary of much loss of life almost upon us I hope that families and friends all over Christchurch take time with those they know who are grieving and allow them to have these special connections with their loved ones just like my beautiful boy did for me.

buildings are well insulated and will provide strong protection from earthquakes and extreme weather conditions. The apartments will be cleaned twice weekly, and the public buildings will be cleaned daily.

The proposed plan is that clusters of 4-6 single units with shared timber decks and green spaces will be located on-site, along with many additional facilities, including a restaurant, café, bar, communal laundry and gym - all the usual facilities that you may well expect in "army camp". But far from being such a thing, what really stands out within the proposal is the care and respect that appears to have been taken with the potential aesthetic aspects of the development.

Large portions of the site will be retained as green space, including existing mature trees, which with the enhancement proposed can only be a good thing. 1.8m high open timber paling fencing, a minimum of 50% transparent, is to be established along all road boundaries, bar of course the entrance to the site, which will be mainly from Madras Street, with a secondary entrance from Canon Street.

These sorts of details show the developer is trying to be sympathetic to the surrounds of the area, and for that I am sure St Albans will be very appreciative. Careful consideration is shown further with swipe card access, and strict rules to be enforced in regards to the use of the bar and restaurant facilities being for residents only. The site will also be have 24 hour security.

All additional on-site amenities such as planter boxes, picnic tables, cycle storage and, interestingly, some communal sports courts (which will have separate access and be available for public use also) are required to be in place prior to any occupation, again a careful consideration in the councils conditions of consent.

All of these conditions, including other details like the restriction of the color palette on the exterior cladding of the accommodation units and their reflectivity, I believe has made this a very worthwhile development. The additional life it will bring to the area can only be seen as positive for the community, as local businesses see the increase in patronage, and the once large evesore of the site itself is bought back to life. 10 years on (the projects end date being 2022) there will be a lasting legacy in the beautification of the site, of course meaning an increase in the surrounding land value. \mathfrak{R}

Love For Music Ageless

Harold Pearse, aged 91, has been a resident of St Albans for over 50 years and is one of the longest serving members of the St Albans Community Choir.

Originally an engineer from Hampshire in England, Harold's hobby was cycling. "The only time I could get warm was by being on a bike! I did thousands of miles with a cycling club and time trialing." After the war he moved to New Zealand and he was happy to be sent to Invercargill. "The shingle roads weren't much good for bike racing so I took up tramping. I absolutely loved it and I met my wife Gwenyth through the tramping club."

Harold was always interested in singing. "My wife said that I should get lessons. I would sing along to the radio but we were always so busy I didn't really have time for it. It was not until Gwenyth passed away that Harold considered joining a choir and

the St Albans Community Choir was starting out.

Harold joined the choir 15 years ago and has been a member ever since. "The singing is such good therapy – I'd recommend it to anyone. And the people are wonderful." It wasn't until Harold turned 80 that he began formal singing lessons.

Heather Mitchell-Gladstone teaches Harold and leads the choir. "Harold is a baritone. He sings with great passion and loves to sing strong ballads. If he had trained earlier, I believe he could have become a professional singer. He has that stage presence and ability to have a rapport with the audience," says Heather.

Harold's children and grandchildren have all heard him sing. "They put a good face on it but most of the modern generation aren't really into the songs I sing," says Harold.

Heather adds, "Harold gets on well with the choir and people love to hear his interesting stories. I also enjoy singing duets with him."

Mel and Zoe's Alterations and Design Studio: straight seam to carpark

Mel Knight and Zoe Miller have what may be the best street sign in the city, advertising their design and sewing alteration services: a 1950s woman with gloves, hat and two-piece cream and cinnamon suit, leaning towards their big brick fence on Edgeware Road.

Designed and built for them by Sumner artist Jason Kelly, Mel says they wanted something that was quirky — "retro with a twist." "We told Jason what we wanted and he designed and built it."

For the past six years the pair's sign has been highly visible on the main road through Redcliffs.

But with repairs needed to those premises and with the bumpy roads dissuading some city customers from making the trip to the beach, a shift to a more central, accessible location was needed. "Business after the quakes was good, but the containers are a deterrent for some people. We knew the shop needed repairs so we would be disrupted for that."

The pair moved into their new quarters, a massive old villa with a wrap-around verandah, in the long-blocked part of Edgeware Road in November. They were fully hoping the road would be open by Christmas.

"We are thrilled to be on Edgeware. The work crew was awesome, they kept in touch and were so kind to the residents. They did their best," says Mel.

Yes, she and Zoe would have loved the road to be finished by Christmas, but they took the new opening date in their stride



and advertised access to their carpark in places their customers could see. "The whole city is dealing with the aftermath of the earthquakes," Mel says.

"You are either in or out. We are in. We have a good client base and this site has plenty of parking and now easy access. I personally think the road is a work of art."



Pete is getting a plan of the project with costings to get the agreement in principal of the project. He has visited parks suggested by the staff to look at track materials and exercise equipment.

'Traffic Needs in the North of Christchurch'

'Rich Road – Poor Road, "Fendalton Rd or Brougham St for St Albans,' The Northern Arterial – The final Chapter?' Sparks Fly Over Roundabout,' Whom Did You Elect? – Traffic engineers or Community Board Members?' 'Controlling the Traffic Flow'

These are all titles from StAN articles in 1994, the year Transit NZ officially lifted the 1966 Northern Arterial Motorway designation and the CCC abandoned, after much community pressure and legal advice against it, its bid to take on the designation

The following is an extract of: "The History of the Northern Arterial" presented by Muriel Soanes at a meeting attended by 200 residents to try and influence CCC not to pick up the designation. Muriel had been actively involved with this issue for 28 years and kept extensive documentation on the subject.

"I would like to give some of the history of the Northern Motorway. I am one of the 366 residents who received notices in September 1966 notifying us our properties were required for a 6 lane motorway.

We believed it was going through within five years. Many residents sold their properties for a mere pittance. The elderly had no chance of regaining their losses.

We waited 13 years for the next move. No satisfaction was received from enquiries at the City Council nor the (then) Ministry of Works during that period.

We learnt in December 1979 that a 4 lane Northern Arterial was proposed.

Properties not required after all were uplifted from

the designation. The owners of those properties sold to the Ministry had the right to buy them back, but not at the price they received originally!

In 1985 a Twiswig Report was produced by a Transport Working Group. Submissions were to be heard on 15th July at a Tribunal Hearing. Representatives from the St Albans Residents Association went to this hearing and managed to get a 3 month postponement of the hearing, so they could study the report. However, the Tribunal Hearing did not take place till November 1987. At this time were had been waiting 21 years for a solution. The report from the Tribunal in March 1988 said: 'I would be surprised and disturbed if the first stage did not proceed within 5 years.' That period finished last year.

In 1988, 27 homes were demolished to put in a crossroad linking Warrington St with Cranford St.

In August 1990, 24 years after the announcement, Transit NZ scrapped the plan. The CCC was given the opportunity to decide if it wanted to continue with the plan and finance it. The decision had to be made by 31st March 1991. The Council failed to come up with the finance. It even approached Transit NZ to give them the properties already purchased by the Crown, but Transit NZ declined.

For 3 years since then, we have lived in limbo. We couldn't sell

privately, Transit wasn't buying houses and the CCC had no authority to do anything. The whole situation was handled disgracefully."

Now in 2013 we have a new 30 year transport plan. This plan shows no details on how increased traffic will be dealt with in the area. This plan has 2 arterial roads stopping at the St Albans boundary and it does not show how it is planned to disperse this traffic. This should be ringing some alarm bells for the residents of St Albans who are still feeling the effects of the previous management of the last 30 year 'plan.'

I have also recently attended two meetings with CCC and CCDU staff who have stated the 4 laning of Cranford street is a given.

Attached to the Dec 5th 2012 Shirley/Papanui Community Board Agenda is the October 2012 Update of current projects (for elected members from CEO Tony Marryatt) which states the 4 laning of Cranford St is at preliminary design stage. (incidentally, this was the only project for the St Albans area!)

After putting this community through almost 30 years of 'disgraceful' handling of traffic issues in St Albans it is possible that it is going to happen again? Are the needs of one person/ one car commuters from the north going to be put before the quality of our lives and the

TC3 Insurance Claims

It is exciting to finally see buildings rebuilt and homes and businesses re-established in St Albans. But for people with TC3 land, and there are plenty of us here in St Albans, this might still feel like a distant dream. Uncertainty about land conditions, damage and foundation solutions may seem almost insurmountable.

The former Department of Building & Housing has recently re-released Guidance: Repairing and Rebuilding Houses Affected by the Canterbury Earthquakes. It is intended to reflect new knowledge and foundation options that will make some sites easier to deal with. As a lay person, they are extremely technical and complicated. The level of damage sustained by TC3 land and buildings still dictates the level of geotechnical engineering information needed for a repair or rebuild and usually, the foundation solution.

If you need site specific engineering information and foundations, the engineers' fees are usually covered by your house insurance policy as are the additional costs of building TC3 foundations. In most cases, it is safer to let the insurer meet these costs as they are incurred, rather than cash settling your TC3 claim, despite how tempting that may be. Cash settling when you don't know exactly what's involved in your repair or rebuild may leave you out of pocket.

We recently had built a double burner stainless steel bbq trailer thanks to Z.

One of the uses of the bbq is to help local organizations with their fundraising efforts. This season the trailer has been used by two local schools, one of whom reporting making \$2000 from the bbq alone. 


