Residents living in St Albans have a long history of contributing to the development of their own lives than this (often) random pick of our decision makers.

The St Albans Residents Association (SARA) Inc has a record of involvement in community building that stretches back almost 50 years. Its impact on community spirit was particularly strong from the mid 1990s, focused around the community centre. The outgoing "Civil Tower of Power" has post- earthquake failed/refused to support SARA and therefore has denied all of you the resources and voice, which this organisation has built up over the past 15 years, to help in the recovery of your lives.

SARA has been forced to limp along for three years without a community centre or any staff. But it is only limping, not broken. It is ready for some creative, skilled visionaries to take it into the future.

The current governing committee has done an excellent job of recouping the organisation's resources, which are invaluable to a community, and are looking at how to make SARA more effective in the future.

We have been devising a development strategy for locals to use to achieve projects they want in their community, using SARA's resources. We have also been looking at ways to make SARA a sustainable organisation and a focus for 2014 will be the development of a social enterprise for St Albans – perhaps a movie theatre! We also want to see more local events happening and to tap the creativity and energy of young St Albans people in the development of their new world. We look forward to St Albans becoming an inclusive community, accessible for all.

None of this is going to happen unless residents of St Albans lead it and at present there are not enough of you talented people working together to ensure St Albans doesn't become the Bronx of the brave, new city.

Being part of this organisation does not mean attending meaningless meetings. It is networking and working with your neighbours to make your homes and lives happy and safe.

Bring along your family and friends to the Edgeware Croquet Club, beside the Bowling Club on Forfar St and join others from the St Albans Community for a shared BBQ on Sunday September 22 @ 11am. Our AGM will start at 2pm and SARA needs its supporters to stand up and help – right now.

Like many other people in this suburb I feel that use of the name Edgeware instead of St Albans, the golden suburb as I have heard it called, is clearly wrong. This confusion is well illustrated by the letter from Charles Poynton on page 3 of the newsletter from July 2013. My answer is that the word Edgeware should be restricted to Edgeware Village in the heart of St Albans and Edgeware Road that runs right through it from Springfield Road to Hills Road. Officialdom seems to be the main culprit, judging by the Edgewareaddressed mail that I receive in Packe Street. The boundaries of St Albans are partly less easy to define, although at least Bealey Avenue to the south, Papanui Road to the west and Hills Road to the east are clearly demarcated. The northern boundary is not so straightforward and thus more difficult to spell out so I shall simply rest my case here.

Community Board Meeting, June 19th 2013

NORTHERN ARTERIAL INFORMATION REQUEST

The Board received correspondence from Emma Twaddell, Chairperson, St Albans Residents Association requesting information regarding the process taken for the Northern Arterial Plan and consultation. Specifically, how the preferred route was selected.

The Board decided to request that staff inform the Board of answers to Emma Twaddell's question on the process taken for the Northern Arterial Plan and consultation and how the preferred route was selected.

CRANFORD STREET FOUR LANING AND REZONING

The Board considered there was a need to rezone the land to Business/ Commercial either side of Cranford Street from the northern end of the rural section of the street to Bealey Avenue, due to the proposed four laning of part of Cranford Street. The Board believed this would encourage the development of appropriate commercial premises.

The Board decided to request that staff provide guidance to the Board on the process available to it to advocate for a zoning change.

Community drives inclusion for all people

I have been extraordinarily lucky to work recently with the St Albans Residents Association (SARA) and the St Albans Community. I met Emma through the CERA Community Forum and have known Hine for many years.

About 15 years ago my sister Claire, her husband, Paul, and their children lived in Forfar St and the kids went to St Albans Primary School Te Tikanga Rua Reo. Therefore the area was familiar to me but I didn't quite get the enormity of what the suburb has achieved until after the earthquakes.

St Albans is a vibrant, hard-working suburb and the Residents Association has been a leading community group for many years. St Albans is vocal, stroppy and has survived. It seemed the perfect suburb to facilitate a project that intentionally set out to include people with disabilities and their families into the local community.

The Human Rights Commission sponsored the project until June this year. Project goals were set and a steering group formed. Despite the weariness of everyone involved it is a dynamic group that has achieved much.

Achievements have been both tangible and unexpected. These include examples of leadership and the community itself being more receptive to diverse peoples.

ACCESS

Access issues, both good and not so good, have been raised and publicised by the group. There will now be an on-going relationship with the only active Barrier Free Auditor in Christchurch, BJ Clark.

For example, the rebuilt SuperValue supermarket has been commended for its simple but accessible design and build. SARA has been supportive of this business, as it has been with many others, who are working to become more accessible. The Steering Group did have concerns, however, about the corner of Cranford Street and Westminster Street. Alongside the new business and retail complex is an extremely high and dangerous kerb cut. We believe that this was "deemed" necessary to prevent future flooding. Concern was certainly expressed to CERA and the Christchurch City Council about the lack of consultation and the resulting curb that is not only a hazard for people with disabilities but for lots of community members. While planters have been put in place a more permanent and thoughtful solution still needs to be found.

Why building accessible structures and spaces is so important is outlined in a short video clip produced by the CDHB. All the information in the video clip originates from St Albans, describes local access concerns, and now this video will become the template for other communities across Christchurch. Another project likely to succeed is a forthcoming children's book about Cranford Street, its history and its people. SARA has been involved with all lobbying related to Cranford Street. There have been battles along the way and the good fight continues. This children's book will illustrate the adventures of Cranford Street, historically and now. Making Cranford Street accessible to all people is a top priority for the Steering Group.

This very newsletter can now be read by people who are blind or visually impaired. The Steering Group is working with the Royal New Zealand Foundation of the Blind to ensure that all community members can access the newsletter, using a variety of formats..

Malvern Park is heading for a facelift over the next few years and will include a walking track and exercise equipment for people to use. Discussions have started with the Council to make this accessible for all residents.

COMMUNITY DISCUSSION

Hine led a community discussion in mid-May. She led this discussion promoting the inclusion for all people and invited people to talk about why this is so important and how this can be achieved. This conversation provided a unique opportunity for the community to talk about issues for some of its residents. Paul Gibson, the Disability Rights Commissioner, attended this Forum and indicated how forward-thinking St Albans was. "Nothing About Us, Without Us" was the theme of the night.

THE STRATEGIC PLAN

St Albans has been working on its priorities and actions over the last year. The areas that you as a community want focus on are: Built, Services, Recreation and Strategic.

Rather than having an additional theme that focussed on inclusion of disabled people the community made it really clear that they wanted all 20 actions to be inclusive. The strategic plan is based on the Newlands Model and SARA again is to be commended for its vision.

As we were working on specific issues to help disabled people I became much more aware of the community as a whole. It is strong but tired, disillusioned but keeps on including people like us because they see no other way.

Inclusion of disabled people is important to the whole community. The St Albans community also needs to be included in the life of the city. It has been my privilege to be a part of the community for a short time and know that all people will benefit from the unique mana that St Albans possesses.

The mayor needs to make decisions for our wide community, and bring together a huge number of conflicting views around the council table. When necessary, he or she needs to show leadership and make decisions on matters where entrenched views don't present an easy way forward.


The mayor has the duty to ensure the transparent workings of the complex body, the Christchurch City Council and its corporate holdings. He or she needs to be well informed on all economic bases and is also expected to advocate on behalf of the community.

The mayor presides over council meetings and needs to provide leadership and feedback to other elected members, and ensure that there is a smooth interface between them and management staff, who are employed by the mayor and councillors.

Both the in-house and more public roles require a high degree of statesmanship and charisma, and a vision of what the city should look like in the future.

While the mayor shares many of the same roles and responsibilities as his fellow councillors, his or her role as a team leader and figurehead for our city cannot be underestimated. The mayor's personal leadership style sets the tone for the rest of his team, and to a certain extent determines the attitude the media will take in reporting and commenting on the doings of our council.

This is a job that requires a very impressive CV, the calm exterior of a diplomat and a passion for public service. Perhaps all this could be put in a nutshell by saying that our mayor needs to be a good politician and at the same time an honest citizen. æ

Standing for the Mayoralty, I express my policies for the whole of the City which will also benefit St Albans at the local level.

Three urgent matters are; resolution of the councils insurance claims, appointment of a new permanent CEO and greater transparency. In respect to the latter, departmental managers will attend council committee meetings so as they can be questioned and held accountable on how they arrive at recommendations. This will assist the CEO in their role, as they cannot be expected to know everything. It is simply too big for them. I want to see council proceedings posted live on the internet.

I support the sale of some council assets with the view to shrinking the size of the council to concentrate on core activities such as parks, recreation/amateur sports grounds and transport infrastructure. The councils vast property portfolio leads to "public excluded" meetings due to commercial conflicts of interest.




What I really want to do for St Albans is what I want to do for the whole city.




One of the keys to community is tradition and heritage.

The Councillors

The new Local Government Act of 2002 and the progress made in the field of technology, has meant that the job description of City Councillor has changed radically. In the past, we elected our Council and left them to get on with it.

In contrast, councillors now govern under a constant media spotlight—and whereas in the past it was assumed that councils had access to superior knowledge and expertise, the Internet has made it possible for everyone to access the same information, which means that councillors now need to govern in close partnership with other organisations and with the public. In addition, there is the expectation that councillors will be readily accessible to the public at all times.

Far greater consultation in planning and decision-making is expected and councils must plan strategically rather than allow development to happen in an ad hoc manner.

The issues facing the new council couldn't be more complex or have more far-reaching consequences. While keeping in mind the views of their constituents, councillors must process scientific evidence and other professional advice, be aware of the financial implications of any proposal, preserve heritage values and balance the urban and rural economies under the Council's jurisdiction. **#**



We need leadership and a fresh new energy in our city councillors.

With more than 16 years in business and a passion for getting things done, I will bring an intelligent, positive vibrancy to council. I'm working with Rebuild Christchurch and the Canterbury Insurance Advocacy Service - people are the recovery of this city.

Strong communities make a strong city. We must consider different and innovative ways of doing things. Just because "it's always been that way" or "that's the way we've always done it", doesn't mean there isn't a better way.

St Albans is also a key part of the new cycleway network and my intention is to make this the most successful part of the entire network whilst enhancing connectivity of the community along the way. This will make cycling to schools, parks, shopping centres and the city safer than ever before. I have a commitment to make St Albans a better place to live and that is my promise to you.



I will provide a Councillor who LIVES in St Albans (Rutland St) where I raised my kids. That'll give St Albans a strong voice in the City!

We all know the Council is broken, and needs fixing, riven with an inability to work together, and failing us on the basics. If a building's basic structure fails, we pull it down and start again. So let's have CHANGE on COUNCIL, wipe away some of the current leadership and put in people who can move things forward by working together.

I would address as part of Town Planning and the District Plan Review, the growing congestion problems on Papanui Rd resulting from the Northlands Mall expansion. I would address the rent gouging that takes advantage of local people trapped by earthquake issues.

I was appalled at the 1902 then 1896 St Albans Methodist Churches being demolished (Rugby Street/Papanui Road). Both could have been saved with more creative leadership from local councillors committed to local heritage.



Why has Edgeware Rd been closed in one form or another since September 2010? It's barely a mile long. I want to concentrate SCIRT's efforts in St Albans to get in and out in a reasonable time: we're tired of road cones and lumpy footpaths.

I'd like to develop the community facilities to include a community constable's office, a library check in console and drop box. What happened to the public toilets?

I want to develop St Albans' relationship with the central city – it's the first village going out of town and as is special, but parts of the city need to stay there – the prostitutes.

I want to alleviate the pressure on Sherborne/Cranford St during peak hours by developing a Christchurch suburban rail link to Rangiora and Rolleston. I also want traffic lights at the top of Colombo St – I've seen too many near misses.

St Albans/Edgeware is a special village needing someone in council's affection: it has mine.



I have faithfully and consistently advocated for the needs of the St Albans community as an elected representative for 9 years. I am a member of St Albans Baptist church and the Neighborhood Trust and have supported the many programs run in St Albans by these organisations.

The Edgeware Master plan design and confirmation was a significant step in the St Albans road to recovery and over the next three years I will continue my support for this development by advocating for the necessary funding and resources at council level. Once this is built, I truly believe St Albans will be one of the most vibrant suburbs within our city. The completion of the cycle ways is another issue I will continue to support in order to provide safe active transport options for all.

Community Board Candidates

Community boards consist of five elected board members as well as the ward councillors.

The community board's role is to listen to resident's aspirations, needs and priorities and act as an advocate for the interest of the community. They are a vital stepping-stone between the community and council, enabling any individual to take part in the political process.

Even though it is considered to be a part-time job only, they will be taking on a significant role. A role that looks likely to have more delegated to them in the new term. The Community Board needs to recognise the communities in their ward that have a distinct character, like St Albans, and ensure they are provided with the opportunity for a voice in local council decision-making.

Community boards allocate funding which is intended to support community-focused organisations whose projects contribute to the strengthening of community wellbeing in the Christchurch City area.

Pauline Cotter, Aaron Keown, Jonathan Corfe and John Stringer are standing for Councilor and Community Board. Robbie Naysmith, Gemma Maslin and Damian Neale did not supply a profile

I believe that healthy families build strong communities and that together we are able to achieve more. Healthy families need to have basic issues addressed; adequate housing, opportunities to develop positive life skills and safe neighbourhoods. They need community facilities that provide connection points with each other and must be empowered with input into decisions that impact them. They need positive, collaborative, leadership that serves their community first.

These are areas that I will advocate for and support, applying my business skills, a heart for this community and ability to get people working together. I will listen open-minded-ly, think independently and work collaboratively to find solutions that fit this community.

- More community spaces and better utilisation of existing facilities, these facilities are the key for our community to engage with each other.






